GRAND LODGE MASONIC MUSEUMS AND LIBRARY

As described by Bro. John A. Hughes, Jr, Gurator and Librarian, our Museums are a pride and treasure to us all. The one located on the third floor of the Baltimore Temple was established in its present state 1940. On display are old money, patents, clocks, jewels, swords, etc. Among the more important items are the desk that Gen. George Washington used when he resigned his commission as Commander-in-Chief of the Continental Army; memorabilia of PGM Thomas J. Shryock who served from 1885-1918 and died in office; a Torah recovered in 1944 from a bombed building in Livorno, Italy as a result of WWII hostilities; a copy of the Martin Luther Bible printed in 1697 in Germany; a chair used by Bro John Coats, our First Grand Master who served from 1787-1810; the original jewels worn by the officers of Concordia Lodge No. 13 from 1794-1937; and a collection of "pennies" from 1928 to date used to pay the Craft at Bonnie Blink during corn-husking. Items having Masonic value with a definite historical background would be welcomed.

Our Library is located on the second floor of the Temple contains material of Masonic research and reference as well as current papers and periodicals from other jurisdictions and popular magazines.

These facilities are open every day, Monday through Friday from 9 A.M. to 9 P.M.

The Masonic Museum at Easton is located at 23 N. Harrison St. It is the site where Maryland Freemasonry was organized on April 17, 1787. It has operated since 1974. Coats Lodge No. 102 is responsible for its maintenance under its Curator, Bro. Sam Hemming. Visiting hours are from 2 P.M. to 4 P.M. on Saturdays and by special request. The collection includes displays and pictures of Eastern Shore Masons, jewels, mementoes of PGM Daniel Hope and other priceless objects. It is a source of pride to Masons and the citizens of Easton.
