# AN AUTUMNAL MESSAGE TO EACH MARYLAND MASTER MASON



Dear Brother:

"Time's aflittin" as the good old Pennsylvania Dutch say. When you read this message, I will have approximately two months to serve as your Grand Master. It has been a marvelous experience for Ruth and me, and I wish to express my personal appreciation to all who made it possible for me to occupy the highest Masonic office in this great jurisdiction of ours. The many kindnesses extended to us; the loyal support given to

our objectives and leadership; the encouragement and prayers expressed along the way; all have meant more to us than words can express. I humbly say, "Thank you so very much for the greatest honor granted me, apart from my ordination into the Christian ministry".

The evening I was installed as your Grand Master in 1976, I adopted as the theme for my two years in office — "Possibilities for Renewal" — believing it imperative that we recognize the need for renewal, and accept the challenge of change in an attempt to achieve it. I am happy to report that there are evidences of such renewal in our Grand Lodge and the subordinate lodges —

• One of our aims was to place Grand Lodge on a sound financial footing so as to make it possible to renew the physical structure we occupy in Baltimore, and to better promote the program of Grand Lodge. The members agreed, and unanimously voted to increase the Grand Lodge assessment one hundred per cent.

• In order to reduce the cost of holding the Annual Communication, Grand Lodge accepted the proposal to change the meeting time, reducing it to one day, with the extension of an additional half day, if necessary.

• Another aim was to develop a closer contact and sharing of programs, problems and questions with lodge representatives. For this purpose, regional meetings were held during the first year in various areas of the State with the principal officers of subordinate lodges. The following year, in response to many requests, one-day seminars were held, with more intensive participation through special discussion groups for Worshipful Masters, Senior and Junior Wardens and Secretaries to discuss their responsibilities and overall questions on programing and operations of subordinate lodges and Grand Lodge.

 Open meetings and programs with family participation have been advocated with the idea that the more our families become involved in Masonry, the better it is for the Craft. Such programs have included Masonic service award presentations, entertainments, bus trips, worship services, dinner theaters, picnics and dinners. Many lodges have picked up the challenge and have experienced a revival in interest and attendance.

 For the first time in the memory of your Grand Master, an annual budget was presented to and discussed with the Craft during the two sessions of the Grand Lodge Summer School of Instruction with time given for questions and answers.

• Believing the Grand Lodge Constitution needs to be reviewed from time to time for the purpose of keeping it up to date, a Constitutional Revision Committee was appointed. This Committee has worked diligently and will be ready to present the revised Constitution at our Annual Communication in November.

 More liberal approaches have been taken toward activities of subordinate lodges held on Sunday, and the holding of Memorial Services without the body of the deceased Brother being present. Details appear in Edicts distributed to each lodge.

 A seasonal newsletter, The Freestate Freemason, was launched, communicating news items of interest relating to Grand Lodge, subordinate lodges and each Master Mason.

 To promote greater participation and interest on election night at subordinate lodges, action was taken by Grand Lodge, at the Grand Master's suggestion, to eliminate the reading of Article XXIII of the Constitution in open lodge.

• More members of the Grand Lodge were given an opportunity to serve as members of the Board of Trustees, Board of Managers and Grand Inspectors. This was enabled by vote of the Grand Lodge in limiting service in these offices to a maximum of six years.

 Greater understanding of Masonic Home activities was afforded by two all-day seminars for lodge liaison officers held at the Homes with the administrative staff of the Homes and Grand Lodge personnel participating.

In these and other phases of our program, the challenge for renewal and change was constantly kept before the Craft during the past two years. Time and again I have said, "We either change or die... Let's not fear change... Rather let's face up to it, and be willing to change what needs to be changed for the good of the Craft, and wherever it does not destroy the fundamental tenets of our institution. Thus we will help to preserve one of the grandest organizations on Earth". May this ever be our desire in the years to come.

May God bless you, always, and may the memories of these years in office, as we have endeavored to work together for the good of the Craft, spur us on to greater heights of achievement in Freemasonry.
