

HARVEST HOME DAY. Saturday, OCTOBER 12 will be a very special day, something unique in the annals of Grand Lodge History. On that date, ground-breaking ceremonies will be held for the "All Purpose Building", approved at the May 1991 Grand Lodge Semi-Annual Communication for erection on the grounds of the Maryland Masonic Homes.

This will be an outstanding occasion coupled with the food and fellowship shared with the thousands of Masons from Maryland and other Grand Jurisdictions.

An opportunity to share "The Gift of Life" is available through a Blood Mobile which will operate from 6:30 to 11 a.m. The goal is to take between 125 and 150 pints of much needed blood. If you're under 66 and have not given blood in the six weeks immediately prior to October 12, you are eligible to donate blood. It only takes a few minute and should not interrupt your participation in the festivities.

Festivities begin with registration at 6 a.m. Parking is limited to the Executive Plaza of the McCormich Industrial Park. Shuttle busses will operate between the parking area and the center of activities.

W. EUGENE GUNTHER, P.M., BALTIMORE NO. 210.
Bro. Gunther has been inducted into the 1991 Maryland
Boxing Hall of Fame as recommended in the following
statement prepared by Ray H. Leonard, Jr., Chairman
of the Maryland Boxing Hall of Fame Nominating
Committee.

"Gene Gunther was born in Richmond, Virginia on December 31, 1929, started boxing while serving in the U.S. Army in 1947. While in the Service he was a semifinalist fighting as a welterweight in the All-Japan Tournament in 1947. In all he fought 10 amateur fights losing just two from 1947 to 1949. He said that he was trained by Lew Jenkins, "Seattle Kid", from Baltimore, and Lee Halfpenny.

"Gene turned professional in May of 1949 with Benny Trotta as his manager during his professional career. His first professional fight was against Ernest Ramsey in Baltimore on May 2, 1949 with Gene stopping him via the K.O. route in the 2nd round. Gunther would go on to having 31 professional fights of which he won 22, losing eight with just one draw. His last fight was on August 19, 1954 against Hall of Famer, Rudy Watkins. Twenty of his fights were fought in Baltimore City. Among the members of the Maryland Boxing Hall of Fame that he fought during his career included Ray Klingmeyer, Billy Francis and Rudy Watkins.

"Now retired from the Eastern Stainless Steel after 33 years of service, Gene lives in Dundalk. He certainly has a credible boxing record and meets the required qualifications of the Maryland Boxing Hall of Fame in every manner.

"It is recommended that W. Gene Gunther be seriously considered for induction into the 1991 Maryland Boxing Hall of Fame into the Professional Boxing Category." Congratulations, Brother Gene!

• WILLIAM L. "BILL" HUGHES. A member of Charity No.

134 and the Grand Lodge Board of Managers, has been thrice-fold honored for his many and varied community achievements. The awards by the Federal Executive Board, Interstate Commerce Commission and President Bush's "Points of Light" Committee recognized, among other things, his organization of the first 10K American Legion Charity Race in Maryland, his formation of The Masonic Choir of North Wales and the successful campaign for a public library in northern Baltimore County. Charity No. 234, incidentally, was the first to donate a book: "An Introduction on Freemasonry".

• JOSEPH R. SANCHEZ, SR. Considering what he's done, where he's been, his accomplishments as a citizen and a Mason, one must agree that Joe Sanchez is an achiever. For example, the August 8, 1991 issue of The Dundalk Eagle gives an account of an event 20 years ago on August 1, 1971 when the Sanchez family consisting of his wife and two sons rescued 29 people caught in a flash flood on Golden Ring Road. It was a stroke of Fate that the family took this route. They also happened to have a canoe strapped to the top of their station wagon which enabled them to ferry stranded people to high ground.

Joe also had a charmed life on his job as a connector working 1,250 feet above the ground on a TV tower, and a close call he experienced when working on a 625 foot tower. As a youngster, he dedicated himself to boxing, a discipline which fortified him physically, mentally and morally. It also brought him recognition in the Navy and his being inducted into the Maryland Boxing Hall of Fame as were Buddy Sauerhoff and Gene Gunther, all Past Masters of their respective Lodges. Joe is a four time Worshipful Master of Warren No. 51. During his term in 1984, he and Bob Arnold, W.M. of Oriental No. 158, originated what we know of today as the state-wide "Family Day Picnic". He also perpetuated successfully Warren's outstanding record in support of community charities.

It may be due to Joe's charmed presence that his son, Joe Jr., recently won the White Marlin Fishing Contest in Ocean City that earned a prize of \$132,000, soon to be diminished by extensive expenses. Joe Jr. is competing in the Tournament of Champions in a Tuna competition at Cape May, NJ.

Joe has the gift of a raconteur: A talent of telling of his adventures in a fashion that puts you into the scene. Warren No. 51 should share him with the rest of the Craft!

 REFLECTIONS OF A MASON'S WIFE. The following is a re-print of a reprint reported in the July issue of EMESSAY NOTES published by the MSA. It is an extract of a letter written by Juana Weatherall, wife of PGM James Weatherall of Arkansas which appeared in the November 1990 issue of "The Arkansas Mason". "I am not a Mason. I'm not even a man. Better than both of these, I am the wife of a Mason. Many times I have wanted to stand up at a Masonic function and tell those present just how much the Masonic Fraternity has positively affected may life, but I never quite gathered the confidence. 
