From the Grand Master

Brethren,

As I write this, we are just a few days away from Harvest Homes Day, and those that attended this annual event, got to see our new pavilion. The new one presents a much better appearance, particularly as one comes up the "hill", and one that should last us for many years to come. The construction wasn't even finished, and we were already getting inquiries about renting it - particularly for weddings. We all know well what a beautiful campus we have, and the new pavilion is more in keeping with the rest of our struc

One of the many good things R.W. Bro. George Hunt did, while serving in a number of capacities for this office, was to design a pavilion that he thought would be in keeping with the beauty of the rest of our buildings. What George designed was a little beyond our means, and is not what we built, however, I feel he would be most pleased to see what we actually installed. And, I couldn't think of a more fitting person to dedicate this new structure to, than to R.W. Brother George. Saturday morning, during Harvest Homes Day, at 8:30 a.m. the Grand Line and I will dedicate this new pavilion in George's honor, and have had a plaque to be installed | W. Asst. Grand Tyler Richard H. Uren to commemorate this. In addition, his family will be in attendance for the dedication.

One of the many things I was able to do, during my two years as Deputy, and two years as Grand Master, was to visit many of your Lodges, some that I had never been to before - this I enjoyed immensely, and my two Grand Lines and I thank you, and truly appreciated the many invitations, and the hospitality we enjoyed while there.

While this Grand Lodge has not seen many invitations for Cornerstone and/or Dedication Ceremonies for public building for quite a few years - mostly the dedications we performed were for Masonic properties - we have already dedicated the new library in Thurmont, the new fire headquarters and station 16 in Salisbury, and have accepted invitations for a rededication of the Courthouse in Oakland, and in Chestertown, and to dedicate a new, and quite large, statue of George Washington, to be installed in Washington County. I firmly believe the publicity we have been receiving over the past several years has been bringing us more into the public eye.

I also firmly believe that the Masonic Chip program I instituted this year, will continue to bring us into the public view in a very good way. The Brothers I appointed to this program have done a superb job, and I thank Brothers Marlin Mills, Doug Basset, and Mark Hartz for their efforts – they have worked tirelessly to see this program get off to a great start. I also thank those Lodges that have jumped into this program head on, and have been doing a superb job. In addition, my thanks to all of you who work in our Lodges and committees, for everything you do, for our great fraternity.

And to all the friends that Mother gathered to her from the Staff that would stop by and chat. I like to think that Mother went from your 'angel arms' to the arms of angels in Heaven.

MD CHIP - a PR Homerun!

Collington Lodge No. 230 jumped into the Maryland Child Identification Program ("CHIP") with both feet and their debut event was a resounding success!

On Saturday June 7th, Collington Lodge No. 230 publicly unveiled the Maryland Child Identification Program (MDCHIP) at Bowiefest. Collington's machine and one on loan from the Grand Lodge worked continuously from 11 am until 6:30 pm. During this time, we processed ninety-five children. Added to the five children we processed during our training session weeks before - We have now processed our first 100!

In addition, they handed out over 30 Rain Checks for families to bring their children to the Lodge on Saturday, June 21 to go through the CHIP process.

So, how is this deemed a success? Let's take a look ...

-ID records on over 100 children have been developed (Collington held a training session at the Lodge a few weeks before Bowiefest to get familiar with operating the CHIP system and 5 of their children were test cases. All successful, too.)

-Thirty or more families will visit the Lodge on June 21. A Masonic information table will be staffed and supplied (refreshments and brochures).

-The Masons and their families had the opportunity to interface directly with 100+ families at Bowiefest - demonstrating and discussing Masonic principles.

-This event was heavily advertised by the City of Bowie event organizers (no cost to the Lodge), who were excited to have the CHIP booth offered at festivities. The City gave MD CHIP a prime spot in several of the advertising media.

-Several organizations, including the City of Bowie Police Department, approached Worshipful Master Ray Denmark at Bowiefest to request the MD CHIP presence at their specific events.

Collington's investment in the MD CHIP program is certainly a public relations home run. The Lodge's dedication and the public's interest make CHIP a grand slam for the community, the Lodge and Maryland Masonry.

How do I know? I was there. Families were lined up at the CHIP booth before Bowiefest opened at 11:00 past the 6:00 closing time. With the cooperation of the Grand Lodge loaning a 2nd CHIP machine and a height chart, and the efforts of 10 people all day long (in 90 degree heat), the families of 95 children can rest a little easier now... thanks to the Masons. That's spreading some serious Light!


Collington received numerous positive

comments and feed back with regard to the programs importance and in one case, shock that we were providing the service "Free of Charge." We were also approached by one non-profit group interested in hosting a MDCHIP event.

Finally, let's not forget our annual sales of cotton candy, popcorn and drinks to benefit the C. Elizabeth Reig School here in Bowie. Unfortunately sales were off this year. Certainly the weather had a lot to do with that. However, we did have sales just short of \$400.

All of this could not be possible without the involvement of membership and their families. Thank you to all who participated at this event. A special thanks also goes out to several brothers and their families from St. Albans Universal Lodge who spent hours working the computers and processing children.

Patapsco Lodge No. 183 Heritage Fair Weekend

Every year for the past 33 years the Heritage Fair has taken place in Dundalk, MD. It takes place over July 4th weekend and is a huge part of the culture of our community. Many masons from Patapsco Lodge are involved in planning, setting up, and running the yearly activity. For many years we have poured beer in the beer garden as a fundraiser for the lodge and for the Acacia Club which is a social club for many members from Patapsco Lodge. It was time for Patapsco Lodge to add another job to their list for the Heritage Fair in 2008.

This year we decided to jump right in to the Grand Lodge CHIP program and make Child Identifiation kits for members from our community. We borrowed three Child ID units from the Grand Lodge in order to process as many children as we could. Over 30,000 people attend the three day event so we had no way of knowing how many children would request us to make IDs for them. The Dundalk Eagle, which is our local paper made mention we would be at the fair producing the ID kits for free at the event. We also did our best to let parents of children in our community know we would be at the fair.

Over the weekend we produced over 345 ID kits for children and worked from 8-10 hours per day the entire weekend. We also made several senior ids for members of our community with Alzheimer's disease. It was a huge success for the fair and the publicity our Lodge and the Grand Lodge received from the event was tremendous. We received several petitions directly related to our producing the ID kits free of charge for the community.

Many of the parents commented how nice our kits were compared to what they had paid for through their school. It was a lot of hard work and very challenging since it was our first time working with the Child ID computers. However, I think all volunteers agreed it was a worthwhile event and look forward to setting up our stand at the fair again next year. The units are very easy to use and the program is a great way to reach out to your local community.

Early Connections to Freemasonry



Robert le Bruce (1274-1329) King and liberator of Scotland. Opposed to Edward I of England as King of Scotland in 1296 and fought against him in 1298, but adhered to him during invasion of 1302-04. He murdered John Comyn in 1306

and was crowned as Robert I, King of Scotland, at Scone in 1306.

In the same year he was defeated by the English and took refuge on the coast of Ireland, excommunicated and outlawed. He returned the following year and in two years wrested most of Scotland from the English, routing Edward II's army at Bannockburn in 1314.

He repulsed the English time after time until Edward III recognized the independence of Scotland and Bruce's right to rule by the treaty of 1328 at Northampton. He died of leprosy.

He is traditionally said to have introduced Freemasonry into Scotland and in 1314 established the Order of Herodom for the reception of those Knights Templar who had taken refuge in his dominions from the persecutions of the Pope and King of France.


As part of a combined order, he is said to have established the Royal Order of Scotland at the Battle of Bannockburn in recognition of the Freemasons who helped him defeat the English. His descendant, Lord Elgin, is present head of the Royal Order of Scotland and the possessor of the great sword of Robert le Bruce.

It may be that these Brothers would be happy and willing to contribute their time to the Lodge's involvement in the CHIP program, a Lodge sponsored scout troop, the Demolay, Jobs Daughters, or Rainbow, or other activities of the Lodge. It is up to us to find meaningful work for

our new members and to make them feel at home within their Lodge.

As my time as Deputy Grand Master comes to a close and my level of responsibility steps up to the next level, I must express my gratitude for the support that I have received from every one of you; especially to Grand Master Biggs for being a willing advisor and teacher over the past two years. I have learned much and will do my best to apply that knowledge as I take on the responsibility that will be given to me on November 15th. I know that with the friendship and support that I have received, the Grand Lodge of Maryland will thrive in the coming years.
