

Grand Lodge Election Process



Several times over the past year, the question has come up as to what the election pro-

cedures for Grand Wardens and Deputy Grand Masters are. Therefore, the procedure process used by the Grand Lodge of Maryland follows that all may know and be governed accordingly.

About 1934 the Grand Lodge of Maryland decided to implement a system for the election process for Grand Wardens and Deputy Grand Masters. The reason, at the time, was intended to provide a fair and equitable system for those desiring an elected office.

It was far easier in those days for Masons living in Baltimore City and the surrounding areas to travel to Grand Lodge than it was for those that lived in the outlying areas. In addition, over half of the Masons in Maryland at that time resided in Baltimore City and Baltimore County. Therefore, it was much easier for those living close in these areas to obtain an elected office. This was not a fair system.

Due to this, the Grand Lodge decided that they would institute a process whereby one year the Baltimore City/Baltimore County area, where roughly half of the Masons in Maryland lived, would provide a Jr. Grand Warden, and the same year the State area would

provide the Sr. Grand Warden; the following year this would reverse, and the State area would provide the Jr. Grand Warden and the Sr. Grand Warden would come from the Baltimore City/Baltimore County area. For the office of Deputy Grand Master, the State area would provide a candidate for that office and two years later the Baltimore City/Baltimore County area would provide the candidate, alternating like this every two years.

This system has worked well for the Craft for roughly 72 years; and is still the system in use today. The process has worked well due to the fact that both areas have supported it by not supporting the very few who have ignored it for personal reasons.

Until someone comes up with a better system, agreed to by all concerned, we should continue to support those candidates that abide by the rules.

Any Past Master of the Grand Lodge of Maryland may place his name as a candidate for election when it becomes his area's turn, thus following the established guidelines.

This year the State area will be providing candidate(s) for Deputy Grand Master and Sr. Grand Warden – Baltimore City/Baltimore County will provide candidate(s) for Jr. Grand Warden.

Important Notice

Brethren, the next issue of the FSFM will contain the resumes of those brethren that desire elected office for Jr. and Sr. Grand Wardens, Grand Secretary, Grand

Treasurer and Deputy Grand Master.

The following issue will contain the resumes of those brethren interested in applying for Board of Trustees and Board of Managers.

In keeping with the reduced size of our Grand Lodge magazine, the Grand Master has imposed the following guidelines. A resume for Deputy Grand Master, Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer is not to exceed ½ page – this equates to 300 words. A resume for Grand Warden is not to exceed 200 words, or one column.

Most word processors in use today will provide you with a word count. In MS Word, simply click on "Tools" and then "Word Count".

These guidelines must be strictly adhered to. Resumes submitted that exceed them will be adjusted. Obviously it would be preferable that the writer of the resume edit his submittal as opposed to someone in the Grand Lodge office doing this. Take due notice thereof and govern yourself accordingly.

Bonnie Blink.

Our Medical Director of eight vears. Dr. Robert T. Liberto increased his hours of service. Resident and physician communication has been enhanced and also an increase in the coordination of clinical services.

We have a new front entrance canopy, improved lighting throughout the facility and the dedication of Lunda Laird Hall highlights several improvements.

In December 2005, the Maryland Health Care Commission conducted a resident family satisfaction survey for long-term care facilities in Maryland. Maryland Masonic had a response rate of 82.9% (27.9% higher than the State average.)

Six domains were measured with MMH prominently higher than other MD facilities and an overall satisfaction rate was 4.38 (out of a possible score of 5.) Positive comments that were submitted included: "MMH is far above any other, the staff exceeds my expectations for nursing care and support for my family, the services are excellent, if all nursing homes were run like MMH we would all be lucky, MMH is the best!" This survey confirms once again, the superior services provided at Bonnie Blink.

Nursing Home Week was May 14th through May 20th. Staff, residents and their families came together to celebrate and a good time was had by all who attended.

We again hosted the annual Family Day event Saturday, June 3rd. Thank you to all who joined us on the hill for the fun and fellowship.

In June, I participated in the annual Masonic Homes Executive Association Conference in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin. This is the first time Maryland has attended and I was privilaged to represent MMH. The Conference provides educational sessions and an opportunity to network with other Masonic Homes.

Sadly, our Chaplain, Rev. Bob Brookman is retiring and moving to Colorado this summer. His tenure has brought spiritual support, friendship and love to our residents and staff. We will miss him and wish him many blessings in his new journey.

The Lodge Room Over **Simpkins Store**

While on vacation last summer with my family in Breckenridge, Colorado, we took a short drive to the town of Fairplay to visit a restored mining town. The mining town, South Park City, was a typical re-creation of an old west mid to late 1800's town, complete with houses, stables, doctor's office, general store, saloon and much more. However, what really attracted my attention was the general store, or more particularly, the name: Simpkins General Store.



My mind immediately flashed to the picture and poem that hangs just outside the entrance to our lodge room that I had studied and read many times, The Lodge Room over Simpkins Store. Sure enough, just to the left of the name are the square and compasses. It looked very little like the picture I remembered, and I recalled that the poem was written by a brother from

My Friend Cal **Parker**

I first came to Annapolis in June of 1946 aboard the U.S.S. Block Island, CVE 106. The "BI" had just been decommissioned and was in Annapolis, "Out of Commission, In Service, In Reserve". I was the senior medical department representative left aboard. There was still some work to be done to complete the reserve preservation of the Medical Department. We continued to hold sick call and do some other necessary work. There was a "Catapult School" established on board and the ship was used to indoctrinate Midshipmen. By fall my duties had changed almost completely to North Severn Dispensary and in 1947 I was assigned to the APL on the Academy side. After working in Oklahoma for two years I returned to Annapolis and was employed by W.Y Kitchin at Kitchin Drugs, Inc. Kitchin Drugs had a very good relationship with the Naval Hospital in Annapolis and was permitted to supply some items that were not available through Navy Channels.

I met Master Chief Parker at Annapolis Lodge on several occasions. He was the leading "Chief" at the Naval Hospital when Captain (Dr.) Wm. P. Stephens was the Commanding Officer. This was in the 1960's. We became very good friends. Later, Dr. Stephens retired as a Rear Admiral and began a practice in Annapolis. Dr. Stephens oldest daughter "Missey" grew up and

married Prof. Vernon Tates' son. Missey became a recording artist for Christian Gospel and died just last vear. Chief Parker retired and became a nursing home administrator. We again did much business when he was Administrator of Fairfield Nursing Home in Crownsville. In the mid 60's Calvin ioined Concordia Royal Arch Chapter in Glen Burnie, Maryland. It was my pleasure to be present on the night that he was exalted to that degree and take an active part. Incidentally the Chaplain on that occasion was Ray Lynch (Ray died last spring).

Now you have the background and can see how our friendship developed over the years. Cal presided over all of the York Rite Bodies and was Master of Amos Lodge. He also was the Secretary for a number of years. presided as Grand High Priest, Grand Master of the Grand Council and as Grand Commander of Maryland. Cal worked with Job's Daughters and DeMolay as well. Cal was a most diligent worker for Masonic Youth in Maryland and when he was Grand High Priest established the D. Ross Vansant Scholarship fund.

I am certain that he was given several recognitions for his outstanding work. It was during one of these presentations that we begin to talk about our Navy background. That is how I came to know that Cal was aboard the (Continued on page 7)


