

## **GRAND MASTER'S MESSAGE**

#### **BRETHREN:**



May I have your attention please.

Although many of you may be aware of serious challenges facing Freemasonry today, I want to be sure that all of us realize the gravity of the situation with which we are faced.

In June of 1992, the Southern Baptist Convention voted to approve a study of Freemasonry to determine whether or not Freemasonry is compatible with Christianity and Southern Baptist doctrine. The results of the study are to be presented to the 1993 Southern Baptist Convention on June 15-17. This could result in the condemnation of Freemasonry.

The criticisms are basically the same as

those circulated over many years by religious extremists and others. These criticisms claim that Freemasonry is a religion; it is one of the allies of the Devil; it is a pagan religion; it is anti-Christian and anti-Christ; it is a practitioner of the black arts that springs from the pits of hell and the father of lies, Lucifer.

The reaction of our gentle craft has been inspiring! We are responding to our critics in publications which are loaded with facts and references which refute and defeat in detail any and all accusations: These include The February 1993 issue of The Scottish Rite Journal (S.J.), the February 1993 issue of The Northern Light (Scottish Rite N.J.), and the December 1992 issue of the Short Talk Bulletin entitled "Extremism vs. Freedom". Copies of these publications are available both from the publisher and the Masonic Service Association. Please write for a copy if you do not have one. Copies of the 1993 Scottish Rite Journal were made available to attendees at the recent Regional Meetings, courtesy of Bro. Bernard E. Rothman, S.G.I.G. in Maryland.

Ill. C. Fred Kleinknecht, 33rd degree, Sovereign Grand Commander, S.J., states that it is crucial that Masons who are Southern Baptists become messengers to the Southern Baptist Convention in June. To alert concerned Brothers and show them how to become messengers, the May issue of The Scottish Rite Journal will include an article titled "Carrying the Message - How Does a Mason who is a Baptist Become a Messenger?" This article is included in this issue of The Freestate Freemason so that ac-

tion may be taken early on.

My brethren, knowledge is power. The knowledge contained in the foregoing publications and such volumes as Bro. John J. Robinson's most recent book, "A Pilgrim's Path"; "Masonic Philanthropies" and "Masons Who Helped Shape Our Nation" issued by The Supreme Council (S.J.); are rich and potent sources of the power needed to deal with the criticisms contained in the Southern Baptist Convention study as well as charged by other religious extremists and anti-Masonic groups.

What can we do? As individuals, we must become more knowledgeable about Masonry by becoming familiar with the publications described above; by taking Grand Lodge Correspondence Courses, and by attending Masonic information and education programs during Lodge meetings. To increase Masonic visibility and awareness, Lodge leadership should consider sponsoring seminars, open houses and meetings with Masons, non-Masons, parents and members of Youth organizations; and participation in the Grand Master's Community Awareness Program and other support projects and events.

Regardless of Freemasonry's detractors, we have survived for more than 275 years in our belief of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man. "So mote it be!"

- SEMI-ANNUAL GRAND LODGE COMMUNICATION. Will be held in the Corinthian Hall, Masonic Temple, Baltimore, on May 17, 1993 at 7:30 p.m. New procedures and agenda include:
- . Card System for Voting. A "card" system will be initiated in voting on matters requiring Grand Lodge approval. This is

designed to save time and insure that voting is done by those members of the Grand Lodge who are eligible to vote.

Each Lodge is required to register prior to the communication. Upon registration, each Lodge receives two green and two red cards. Green cards are used to vote for a proposal; red cards to vote against a proposal. The Worshipful Master and Wardens have one vote collectively; the Past Masters also have one vote collectively. When an item is placed on the floor for a voice vote, the per-

son representing the Lodge will hold up one green card in favor of the matter on the floor. If Past Masters are voting independently, one of them will hold up a green card if they are in favor of the matter on the floor. If the Past Masters are not present the Lodge Representative can cast two votes, either for or against the matter, by displaying both cards.

. Amendments - Grand Lodge Constitution. The following proposed Amendment will be voted upon at the Semi-Annual Communication: Amend Art. X, Sec. 1, Subsection D.(2) to increase the amount paid by each Lodge for each member for the use, maintenance and support of the Maryland Masonic Homes, semi-annually, from Two Dollars (\$2.00) to Four Dollars (\$4.00).

 COMMUNICATING WITH OUR MASONIC LEADERS. The messages communicated in the six regional meetings were well received as evidenced by the discussions stimulated on the various subjects on the agenda. The subjects included Grand Lodge Programs and Projects such as the Audit Reporting Program; Blood Donor Program; Correspondence Course; Tour of Great Britain; Planning Objectives for Senior and Junior Wardens; Duties of Grand Inspectors; Dr. John Coats Lodge Endowment Fund; Youth Support; and the State of Grand Lodge Finances. Also, it was mentioned that the Widows' Program and the Grand Master's Awards Program (inputs are required before October 31) were still in effect. Open discussions produced many worthwhile recommendations and questions.

# CARRYING THE MESSAGE

#### HOW DOES A MASON WHO IS A BAPTIST BECOME A MESSENGER?

If you are a Mason and a Baptist, your presence at the Southern Baptist Convention in Houston, Texas, on June 15-27 is urgently needed. The following steps outline how to become a messenger and vote. Only you can prevent an extremist faction from taking over the Convention and obtaining a vote to condemn Freemasonry as incompatible "with Christian and Southern Baptist doctrine."

- 1. Make hotel reservations before being elected a messenger.
- 2. Let your pastor know you desire to be a messenger.
- 3. Attend the business meetings of your local church.
- 4. Be present when messengers are

selected.

- 5. Obtain the necessary card of authorization signed by your pastor or your Church clerk.
- 6. Be sure to take the card to the Convention.
- 7. Take care to present your card at the registration desk.
- 8. Get your book of official ballots and instructions.
- 9. Register as early as Sunday, June 13, or Monday, June 14, before

the formal opening of the Convention.

10. Be in your seat at the opening of the Convention on Tuesday, June 15, stay through every session, and have your ballots with you.

11. Remain in your seat since it will be difficult to know when the important vote on Masonry will come up. You could lose the opportunity to vote by being out in the halls or elsewhere at the time of the vote.

12. It is important to be present and to vote regardless of the position taken by the Home Mission Board. If the Board's recommendation is favorable to Freemasonry, anti-Masons will reject it or try to amend it to condemn the Fraternity unless Masons are there in sufficient numbers to defend our position.

Fellow Masons/Messengers, meet me in the Astrodome June 15, 1993! The fate of Freemasonry today depends on you!

On January 26, 1793 a dispensation was issued by Grand Lodge authorizing 15 brothers to work as a Lodge. Of these 15 brothers, 12 members of Baltimore Union Lodge No. 21 (Virginia) and three members from other Lodges were the petitioners requesting authority to set up a new Lodge in Baltimore. The endorsement and recommendation of Washington Lodge No. 3 was secured before the petition was submitted.

Concordia Lodge is the oldest Lodge in

continuous existence in Maryland. Chartered on April 14, 1793, it worked without interruption throughout the anti-Masonic period.

The anniversary celebration, including a dinner took place at Boumi Temple with Grand Master William M. Clark, Jr., in attendance. Presiding in the East in this special year is Worshipful Master Donald R. Williams.

• MT. HERMON NO. 179. As announced by Worshipful Master Michael E. Rutledge, on May 1 the 100 year old cornerstone of the Masonic Temple will be removed and its contents examined by Grand Master Clark who will then re-lay and rededicate the stone.

The cornerstone was laid by the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia on May 2, 1893. Bro. Thomas J. Shryock, Grand Master of Maryland was represented as well as members of Lodges of MD, VA and D.C. The original minutes noted that: "The gavel used by M.W. Grand Master L. Cabell Williamson of the G.L. of D.C. on this occasion, was the same gavel that was used by our Brother George Washington the Father of his Country, when the Cornerstone of the United States Capitol was laid in 1793 (100 vrs. ago). The sterling silver trowel, was one of the Secretary's silver wedding presents of 1879; it had never been used before. It was baptized in Cement."

• PENTALPHA NO. 194 & MON-TGOMERY NO. 195. Both of these Lodges were chartered on Nov 22, 1893. Due to flood conditions, the Grand Lodge Chartering Party was forced to stop at Pentalpha Lodge in Gaithersburg first, then proceeded to

Rockville. W.M. William L. Coldiron of Pentalpha and W.M. Donald L. Frear of Montgomery are planning appropriate gala ceremonies the latter part of this year.



# VIEWS AND CHUCKELS

• SQUARE AND COMPASSES IN THE VATICAN. Bro. Mark Dreisonstok, Senior Warden of Bethesda No. 204 reports an interesting experience which he though might be of interest. His narrative follows:

"In 1990 I spent a sweltering June in Rome — an exciting and crowded time, in the midst of the 'World Cup' soccer match and an Italian railway strike. One of the highlights of a trip to the Italian capital is a tour through the Vatican City State, the smallest independent state in the world.

"The Vatican is not only a pilgrimage destination of the Catholic faithful, but a treasure chest of some of the greatest masterworks of western civilization. The fountains and columns of Bernini are a Baroque forging of the pageantry of sound and silence, of movement and monument frozen in stone. Looking above within the Sistine Chapel, Michelangelo shows us Creator and created touching in a focal point of universal truth. The Vatican Museums have on display the refined, harmonious sculptures from Greco-Roman antiquity.

"Surrounded by such inspiring artworks of the past, it is easy to miss a discovery which should fascinate a Masonic visitor to the Vatican. In the Vatican library, along the corridor, there is a map of Rome with a baby on each side. The baby on the left of the map is standing with a Square in his hand, while the one on the right is seated with a pair of Compasses in his hand! As these are the only such instruments in this section of the wall mural, an uncanny similarity to the symbolism of Freemasonry cannot go unnoticed.

"The photo shown below has something very worldly about it. The babies, for instance, have no wings, and thus cannot be called cherubs or small angels. The map seems to have more political than spiritual value.

"Yet perhaps there is more than meets the eye in this wall mural, which probably dates from the 17th or early 18th century. Often in emblems of this time, two children or cherubs are seen representing opposite tendencies within the same picture. Perhaps the baby with the Square - an instrument of design and construction - represents the work of the church in the world, what needs to be built and carried out. The baby with the Compasses might represent the world beyond, as circles and geometrical creations drawn by compasses are ideal forms not of our material world.

"If this interpretation is valid, there is a striking resemblance between the symbolism of Masonry and the Emblems contained in this wall mural in the Vatican. In any case, the presence of the Square and Compasses in the Pope's library leads us to speculate that the Roman Catholic Church and the Masonic Order may have more in common than is generally supposed."
