BONNIE BLINK'S GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY OCTOBER 10, 1981

Fifty years ago, on October 10, 1931 at 2 P.M., Brother George W. Livingston, Acting Most Worshipful Grand Master, presided over the Cornerstone laying of the main building at Bonnie Blink. The Right Worshipful Grand Marshal at that time was Brother John H. Hessey, Most Worshipful Past Grand Master.

The trowel and gavel used was the same employed by Brother George Washington when as Acting Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in Maryland, laid the cornerstone of the National Capitol at Washington, D.C. in 1793.

On October 10, 1981 at 2 P.M., Brother Bernard E. Rothman, Most Worshipful Grand Master, will preside at a special communication of the Grand Lodge for the purpose of laying the cornerstone of the new Health Care Facility at Bonnie Blink. The same precious trowel and gavel used 50 years ago will again be brought into service for this occasion through the courtesy of Potomac Lodge No. 5, D.C., custodian of the gavel, and Alexandria-Washington Lodge No. 22, Alexandria, VA, which cares for the trowel.

Family and friends are cordially invited to share in the festivities and to enjoy a pleasant and memorable Saturday afternoon to celebrate Bonnie Blink's Golden Anniversary of care to those in their golden years. They will also witness a procession of Masonic leaders and active supporters including the Grand Line officers in morning clothes; Past Grand Masters in appropriate dress, jewels and aprons; Grand Inspectors, Deputy Grand Lecturers, Subordinate Lodge officers and Past Masters in dark suits, jewels and aprons. "IN THEY HOLY NAME, WE PRAY"

One of the very first things we learn upon being received into Masonry is that before any great or important undertaking, we are taught to pray to God for His strength and aid. This is done not only for our own personal benefit in facing up to it, but also for the purpose of reminding ourselves that without God's strength and aid the undertaking could fail. From that momen on, as we proceed through the three degrees on our way to becoming Master Masons, we are continually made aware of our relationship to God and the importance of private and corporate praying. Not only do we offer up prayers to Deity mentally, but prayers are also spoken orally on behalf of all members at the opening and closing of the Lodge meeting.

Thus, prayer has been woven deeply into the fabric of Freemasonry and is that sacred moment when each Mason communes with his God as he knows, loves and understands Him. Such moments of prayer are important and should never be thought of as a mere conforming to ritual or tradition with little relevance to anything else that may follow after the person praying has spoken the word "Amen." And so it behooves every Chaplain of a Lodge and every Worshipful Master, or whoever offers the prayers, to bring to that moment the proper dignity and solemnity befitting the occasion. In turn, it behooves every Mason present to thoughtfully and prayerfully make the Chaplain's prayer his prayer, or silently speak one of his own.

Since Freemasonry receives into its Lodges Masons found to be worthy regardless of religious convictions, save the belief in the existence of a Supreme Being, prayers given in Lodges or in other Masonic gatherings apart from the Lodge, should be addressed to the Supreme Being only. Such phrases as "Almighty God," "Our Heavenly Father," "Supreme Architect of the Universe," "Gracious God our Father," "Eternal God," "Our Father in Heaven," and "Almighty and Everlasting God" are appropriate ways to address the Deity.

Upon closing the Lodge or some other Masonic gathering with prayer, such phrases as "In Thy Holy and Precious Name we pray," "We ask all these blessings in Thy Holy Name," "With grateful hearts we make this our prayer," "We pray all this in the name of Him whose love is eternal" can be used, followed by the simple word "Amen." And, certainly it is always appropriate, when a concluding thought has been expressed, to simply speak the word "Amen," without using any of the kinds of phrases just suggested.

The reason why we ought to use only the name of the one Supreme Being is that Masonry includes men of all religious persuasions, and at any given gathering of Masons we run the chance of not having all men of the same persuasion present. Thus, to use any other name for Deity is an affront to anyone present whose faith may be rooted in another religious belief. When we welcome brothers into our Lodges of various religious convictions, let's not make it awkward for them during those sacred moments of prayer, by using names other than those used when referring to Almighty God, to which they do not pay homage. Worshipful Masters and Lodge Chaplains, take due notice thereof and govern yourselves accordingly.
