

PATMOS LODGE NO. 70 CELEBRATES ITS 175TH ANNIVERSARY

May 22, 1997, Ellicott City, MD. One hundred seventy-five years to the date after receiving its charter, Patmos Lodge No. 70 of Ellicott City celebrated its 175th birthday. John C. Naquin, MWGM, the Grand Lodge officers, and their ladies joined Paul R. Reinke, Jr., PM, WM, officers, ladies, and friends of Patmos Lodge for the event. A Bronze commemorative coin was struck for the occasion.

The evening began with the opening of the Lodge — just long enough to receive the Grand Master and record this momentous event in the minute book. Then all adjourned to the banquet hall where PM Donald P. Fink and his wife Mary Ann had prepared a delightful buffet to tempt everyone. Members of Catonsville Chapter, Order of DeMolay helped with serving the food.

With the official minutes recorded and the guests pleasantly stuffed, all returned to the lodge room for the program of the evening. S. Brent Morris, PM presented a paper, "In Harmony and Love": Historical Highlights of Patmos at 175. Bro. Morris recounted how Patmos had originally been chartered to meet alternatively at "Catonsville and Ellicott's Upper Mills"; in 1825 the lodge started meeting only in Ellicott's Mills, now Ellicott City. In its early days it was a moon lodge, meeting on "the Tuesday in each month previous to or on which the Moon is full." This presumably gave the members light to get home after meetings. The lodge was named for the isle of Patmos where St. John the Divine, often confused with John, one of our patron Saints, was confined in a Roman penal colony.

The lodge went dark from 1862-1865, perhaps from pressures of the Civil War. It was rechartered by seven members as Patmos Lodge No. 117 in 1865, but regained its original number six months later when its arrearages were paid to the Grand Lodge. The lodge met in various buildings in Ellicott City: the "Town Hall"; the Odd Fellow's Hall; and the top floor of the dining room extension to the Howard House Hotel. Patmos rented this room from 1901 to 1921, when it bought the building, which has been its home ever since.

Bro. Morris told stories from the lodge records, including Masonic relief of 85 cents for transportation for a distressed Brother. The lodge's "panorama" was proudly displayed. It is a large walnut cabinet with a back lit glass window (originally lit with candles or oil lamps, now with electric lights). A large canvas roll has the emblems of the symbolic lectures painted on it, and the canvas is unrolled behind the glass as the lectures are given. The panorama was purchased for \$87 in 1901 and is believed to be unique.

After the history of the lodge, WM Reinke briefly thanked the guests for joining Patmos in this joyous celebration. Then MWGM Naquin gave his comments on the evening and everyone adjourned in harmony and love. (The oldest minutes of the lodge from 1856 show that meeting also closed in "harmony and love.") (S. Brent Morris, PM)

LODGES OF WASHINGTON COUNTY SPON-SOR COMMEMORATION AND REDEDICA-TION ON THE 130TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE CORNERSTONE LAYING AT THE ANTIETAM NATIONAL CEMETERY.

On Tuesday, September 17, 1867, President Andrew Johnson attended the dedication of Antietam National Cemetery and the cornerstone laying of the Soldier Monument together with hundreds of political, military, and Masonic officials and thousands of citizens. This cemetery had been set aside for the remains of Union troops which had fought at the Battle of Antietam five years earlier. 
