





GRANDMASTER'S MESSAGE

BRETHREN:



I am still in the process of adjusting myself to a new way of life - serving you as Grand Master of Masons in Maryland.

I have been a practicing Mason for some 47 years, serving my Lodge and the Grand Lodge in various capacities. I am fully aware. however, that regardless of years of conscientious service, history will measure me only by my actions during my term of office as Grand Master.

The challenges are the same as always... To face the future without compromising

Masonic principles which have survived for more than 275 years.

Speaking of the future, I came across the following message in the October bulletin of Wheaton Lodge No. 228 written by Worshipful Master Ronald S. Ontko, P.M. Please read it. In abiding by it, the destiny of Freemasonry in Maryland can be assured.....

"We live in times when the exceptional becomes ordinary, when the dreamed-of becomes reality and when words like duty, honor, integrity, fidelity and loyalty seem to be but dim echoes of the past. We have been led to seek an easier course of life. No doubt all this has detracted from the time and effort that we should have devoted to the acquiring and spreading the Light of Masonry.

"We ask ourselves, "Is it too late?" No, it is never to late to use what remains of our short journey for good. So let us be about our business, by re-evaluating the past and using what we have learned that we may better chart the course of the future."

My brethren, our days ahead may appear dark and troublesome, economies must be factored into our future plans and programs but wasn't such the case in the early days? Let us emulate those days. Lodges must become civic and social centers, leaders for the common good of the community in which they are located. Let us not be left behind as just another order to belong to and nothing more.

Let us work together in unity that we may promote good-will among all men in all nations. My best wishes to men of all faiths in celebrating the intent of this holiday season.

GRAND MASTER WILLIAM MARTIN CLARK, JR A

What qualifications are required to be a Grand Master? While being elected by the members of Grand Lodge is a primary consideration, experience and performance are vital prerequisites.

And so it is with William "Bill" M. Clark, Jr., whose Masonic career began 47 years ago when he was raised at age 24 in Bethesda Lodge No. 204. He later affiliated with York Lodge No. 225 serving as Worshipful Master in 1974 and as Treasurer in 1975 and 1976.

He has served the Grand Lodge of Maryland under eight Grand Masters in positions of R.W. Grand Marshal, President of the Board of Grand Inspectors (State Area), R.W. Senior Grand Warden, and two terms as a member of

the Board of Trustees which oversees the



Maryland Masonic Homes, and as R.W Deputy Grand Master.

A 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Mason (Valley of Baltimore), he is also a member of the York Rite Bodies, York Rite College No. 58 and Boumi Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S. He is Past President of the Past Masters' Association of Southern Maryland, and Past President of Andrews Chapter No. 446, National Sojourners, Inc.

A Senior Demolay with over 50 years service, Grand Master Clark was honored on October 11 by the International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay which held an Investiture Ceremony of the the Legion of Honor upon him. He is a World War II Navy veteran, released from Active Duty in

November 1945 with the rank of Chief Petty

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GRAND MASTER TO LEAD TOUR OF GREAT BRITAIN

On June 24, 1993, MWGM William M. Clark, Jr. and his wife, Rose, will lead a group of Masons, wives and friends on a tour to examine our British Heritage. The group will fly from Baltimore-Washington International Airport non-stop to London, arriving the morning of June 25th.

After a bit of rest to adjust body clocks to the five hour change in time, Masonic members of the tour will explore the Grand Lodge building on Great Queen Street. After the tour, they will attend lodge and the dinner that follows. Visitors are expected to wear a dark suit and black four-in-hand tie and to bring their own aprons and white gloves. That same evening, the ladies will have dinner and the show at The Players' Theatre, a recreation of a Victorian music hall.

On day three, the whole group will sightsee around London and attend a West End (Broadway type) theater performance. On the fourth day, Oxford and its university, Bladon (where Sir Winston Churchill is buried) and Windsor Castle will be visited; then, return to London and visit the Mark Masters' Hall and Scottish Rite if arrangements can be made.

On the fifth day, a visit to Salisbury and its cathedral, prehistoric Stonehenge and a night at Bath. It's Wales on the sixth day. On day seven, the group sallies forth from Ruthin Castle to tour Chester, then return to the Castle for a medieval banquet. On day eight, the group tours the English Lake District, and on to Glasgow, Scotland. From Glasgow on day nine, the trail leads by Loch Lomond (taking the high road), Loch Ness (keep all the monsters you can catch) to Inverness, called the capital of the Highlands. From Inverness, on day 10, visit an old fashioned whisky distillery and the ancient town, university and golf links of St. Andrews, into Edinburgh for the night. If arrangements can be made, the group will have dinner at the Royal Scots Club and visit The Lodge of Edinburgh No. 1. On the 11th day, a tour of Edinburgh will occupy the morning. In the afternoon, visit the Grand Lodge of Scotland. On day 12, leave Edinburgh and go through the Cheviot Hills (the original Chevy Chase) and Durham and spend the night at York. After sightseeing in York on day 13, visit a Lodge room in York. From York on day 13, go through Coventry to Stratford-on-Avon for

a performance of the Royal Shakespeare Theater Company. On the 15th day, the group will leave Stratford for London Airport and fly to Baltimore.

Please remember, except for London, lodges will be dark for the summer. However, old Masonic friendships are being invoked to make sure that you get a good slice of Masonic education as well as a taste of British Heritage.

Amendments - Grand Lodge Constitution.

- . On ballot, four proposed amendments failed adoption. These related to concurrent jurisdiction of Maryland and the District of Columbia; concurrent jurisdiction of Maryland and West Virginia; transacting of certain business in a Lodge sitting in the first, second or third degree; and qualifications, compensation and duties of the Grand Tyler.
- . The following proposed Amendment will be voted upon at the 12 Gallons Semi-Annual Communication in May: Amend Art. X, Sec. 1, Subsection D.(2) to increase the amount paid by each Lodge for 11 Gallons each member for the use, maintenance and support of the Maryland ... James M. St. Clair, Montgomery 195 Masonic Homes, semi-annually, from Two Dollars (\$2.00) to Four 10 Gallons Dollars (\$4.00).

State Area Luncheon.

At the luncheon preceding the GL communication, over \$1,000 was raised to be applied to a Mobile Short Wave Radio as part of a Vehicle Short Wave Radio System to be used at Bonnie Blink,in which substantial technical and financial assistance was donated by the Boumi Temple Ham Radio Club and the Scottish Rite. Over the years, over \$8,500 has been raised at these luncheons.

The GM announced that his Edict of Nov 9, 1992 which directed that the new audit report form applicable to subordinate Lodges to be used for the year ending Dec 31, 1992, is amended in that the auditing report will be given at the first meeting in April, 1993 rather than the first meeting in January.
