

### MASONIC CHARITIES OF MARYLAND TO AWARD MORE SCHOLARSHIPS

As planned, a \$1,000 scholarship will be awarded to one high school senior in each of the 23 Maryland counties and Baltimore City. Awards will be made on the basis of leadership, academic achievement and financial need. Lodges will receive further details in the near future on the reactivation of the Educational Grant Program.

#### Golfers Have a Ball

Golfers had a great time at the Sixth Annual Regional Charity Golf Tournament on June 5 at the Talbot Country Club in Easton. There were no holes-in-one to capture the two 1995 automobiles and a \$1,000 cash prize.

However, *Bob Castagnera* did win a cash prize for the longest drive. In addition, the first 12 players in each of the first four flights won gift certificates ranging from \$35 to \$50.

Some of the celebrities present at the dinner and awards ceremony included the R.W. Deputy Grand Master, Bro. John C. Naquin,

Johnny Unitas, Sen. Walter Baker, Bill Fogle, and Clayton Mitchell.

Although non-Masons outnumbered the Masons present, the event presented a great opportunity to demonstrate Masonry's support of the community. Close to \$20,000 was received to benefit the Student Assistance Program and to Reduce Child Abuse.

Masonic Charities of Maryland (MCM) sponsored the event in recognition of Grand Master Ponzillo. The progress during the past five Tournaments has been gratifying and has been the main support for:

The Educational Grant Program (scholarships); The Student Assistance Program (drug education and intervention); and

The Child Abuse Program (a common extension of drug abuse).

These efforts have been applauded by Nancy S. Grasmick, State Superintendent of Schools. In addition, MCM has supported the National Masonic Foundation in its program of Student Assistance and Drug Abuse. Financial aid and leadership suppport has been extended to many Maryland youth organizations.

Grand Master Ponzillo makes mention of the 1995 Conference of the Grand Masters in North America during which the Grand Lodge of AF&M of Maryland was the recipient of the National Masonic Foundation's 1995 "Medallion of Excellence: for Sustained Program Quality, and for Commitment to the Health of the Children.

MCM was the forerunner for the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Program throughout the State of Maryland, which enabled the Maryland State Department of Education to implement and support educational programs. This program was very successful and supported by Governor William Donald Schaefer. Having succeeded in this area, MCM has elected to direct its efforts towards support of the program for Child Abuse in Maryland.

MCM extends its sincerest appreciation for the generous support of its efforts in providing for the youth of Maryland!

#### Columbia and Lynch Join

These two Lodges made the papers when a 121-year split reunited the membership of Columbia No. 58 and Lynch No. 163.

Columbia Lodge was formed in 1815. It seems like there were some differences in sentiment that developed after the Civil War between those supporting the Union and those favoring the Confederacy. This friction resulted in the formation of Lynch Lodge No. 163 in 1873. By 1901, sufficient amity existed for the two Lodges to join in building a Masonic Temple. The cycle was completed by the merger in August 1994. The merged Lodge goes by Columbia Lodge No. 58.
