

Grand Secretary's Corner

At the Grand Lodge Annual Communication November 19, 2001, Grand Master Owens initiated a new procedure for voting. Lodge voting representatives were required to register at the registration desk and obtain their ballots. We used the listing of the Lodges and their assigned representative to the Grand Lodge. If your name was not on the Lodge listing you were NOT eligible to vote. This created some confusion and disappointment for those members in attendance who wanted to vote for their Lodge. I advised them to check with their Worshipful Masters and suggest to him that he designate a qualified person to be in attendance.

The voting procedure was very smooth and the Grand Lodge was called off at 8:20 p.m.

We had twenty-two Lodges not represented at the Grand Lodge and nineteen of the Past Elected Grand Line Officers weren't present. The amendment, limiting the grace period for non-payment of dues to one year passed by one vote and goes into effect as of December 31, 2001.

This same voting procedure will be used at the Semi-Annual communication in May 2002.



Public Installation of Officers took place on Tuesday evening at 7:30 p.m. This was well received by all in attendance. Brethren, there isn't anything more important than casting your vote whether it be for someone in public office or someone representing your Lodge on issues that can have an effect on the administration of your Lodge.

Day 3 we will take the Cabot Trail to Ingonish Beach, via the Canso Causeway to Cape Breton Island and travel along the Cabot Trail, considered by many to be one of the most scenic drives in the world.

Day 4 will find us in Ingonish Beach and Sydney and visit the fortress of Louisbourg National Historic Park.

Day 5 we proceed south across the Strait of Canso to Pictou, known as the "birthplace of New Scotland". It was there that the first boatload of Scottish Highlanders landed in 1773. We then board a ferry that whisks you across the Northumberland Strait to Prince Edward Island.

Days 6 and 7 will find us in Charlottetown, the provincial Capital where we visit their National Park and visit Green Gables farmhouse, the setting of the famous novel, Anne of Green Gables. We then cross the new eight-mile Confederation Bridge to coastal Wolfville and visit nearby Grand - Pre National Historic Park.

Day 8 we will travel through Digby, Annapolis Royal and enjoy a Whale-Watching Expedition. Bring your cameras on this one.

Day 9 We travel to Nova Scotia's rugged southern shores, where a visit to Fisheries Museum is a must. Hugging the shoreline, we continue to Peggy's Cove, one of Canada's most charming fishing villages. We reach Halifax by mid-afternoon

where we will meet with members of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.

Day 10 will find us winging home.

During year 2001 your Masonic Charities of Maryland, Inc. awarded 48 scholarships through its scholarship program. Two scholarships were awarded per County plus Baltimore City. It is our intention that this scholarship program help encourage our youth to prepare as future leaders of society.

With this continuing success and the dire need for these programs among our young people, there is also a dire need for direct donations and endowments to support MSAP and all the other endeavors of the Masonic Charities of Maryland.

The Masonic Homes continues to be a busy and happy place - plenty to do, places to go, eating out, trips, and people with whom to communicate.




Southern Maryland Masonry is alive and well due to the efforts put forth by the Lodges and the generosity of their members.


