You must remember that you wear your respective "collars" 24-7 and are viewed by the Craft as the best of the best. You have been appointed or reappointed because the President and/or Grand Lecturer have great faith in your abilities to strive to be the best. You are the front line and the workers in the quarries and I look forward to working along side each of you in "Making a Difference!"

I have every intention of holding the line when it comes to budgetary constraints. We, the Grand Lodge have come a long way in restoring trust back into the leadership of this jurisdiction. It has not been easy but, with your support and vote of confidence on critical financial issues you have shown an understanding of our situation and I pledge my every effort to continue to build on that trust and be forthcoming with all information as regards your Grand Lodge finances. At the time of this writing we are on the threshold of signing a lease agreement with our chosen developer. The members of the Land Lease Committee under the leadership of R.W. Brother Schneider have been most diligent in securing the best possible deal for the long-term financial health and security of our Grand Lodge. We owe a great deal to P.G.M. Young and the Board of Managers for having the vision to lead us down this path to what should be a sound and stable financial base for our Grand Lodge. I know many of you are anxiously awaiting the results of the negotiations but, let us not forget: "....time, patience and perseverance....."

Letters explaining the Grand Master's Amnesty Program should already be on your Secretaries desks. This is a program I have given much thought to and have consulted with other Grand Lodge jurisdictions that have embarked on similar programs. It is my firm belief we have Brethren out there who are unaware of how to be reinstated or are afraid they will be rejected at the ballot box for not having continued maintaining their membership. From November 17, 2004 until October 17, 2005 I am therefore offering any Brother who has been dropped for "NPD" a chance to re-join the world's greatest fraternity without fear of rejection. Much as the Prodigal Son was received home with opened arms we shall receive back into our fraternity any Brother who remits the current year's dues (2005) without re-petition or ballot. Your lodge secretary has been instructed to attach a dues notice to a form letter written by myself inviting any Brother dropped for "NPD" to rejoin us and whether it be one Brother or one hundred Brethren I trust you will join me in welcoming them back into Lodge. Remember, this is a Program and not an edict. It is simply a tool to be used by any Lodge that feels it could benefit from its use.

We have heard for years now that it's time for us to get our light out from under the bushel basket. My Brethren the time has come to burn the bushel basket and to make our light even brighter. Some of you have heard me quote the Greek historian and philosopher Herodotus: "It is better by noble boldness to run the risk of

being subject to half the evils we anticipate than to remain in cowardly listlessness for fear of what might happen." Essentially he is telling us to have no fear. Land Lease Program

The Grand Lodge is providing this information to keep everyone informed as to the progress of the Land Lease Program. Possibly by the time you are reading this article the lease will have been completed and signed. However, good things take time and the information presented to you is as of December 23rd, 2004.

The Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Maryland, with approval of the Board of Managers and the Land Lease Committee, along with the Shelter Group has reached an agreement in principle regarding the business areas for the proposed lease. The lease is being prepared by the Shelter Group and will be submitted to our attorney. Richard Rubin, for review and comments. The lease will be provided to the Grand Lodge Lease Committee for their review, comments and approval, modification or rejection. Our projection for completion of the total lease agreement is about two months from the date (1/3/05) it is submitted to the Land Lease committee.

The business provisions agreed upon are:

Maximum of 99 years- (No extensions).

Possible signing date January 3, 2005, deposit of (\$25,000)

April 30, 2005 (approximate date) end of feasibility study, deposit (\$125,000).

September 30, 2006 (approx.

date) final plan approval, deposit (\$350,000) total of (\$500,000) retained by the Grand Lodge if Shelter defaults.

March 31, 2007 (approx, date) At Closing - All 99 years of rent will be paid to the Grand Lodge of Maryland. A single check for (\$8,450,000).

NOTE CAUTION==RISKS

There are two issues that the Shelter Group must resolve:

There is a height restriction in our covenant.

There is a height limitation in the zoning regulation.

All parties knew these issues from the beginning. Shelter presented in their proposal a plan to overcome these problems. If they cannot be resolved then we will not lease the property under this lease agreement.

FREEMASONRY -SECRET OR NOT SECRET

Many people are of the opinion that Masonry is a secret society, but I hope to dispel this misconception. There is much that may be told to wife or mother, father or friend - told to the glory and the help of the Ancient Craft with no violation of the solemn pledge sacredly to keep secret that which is secret.

It is no secret that he who becomes a Freemason joins an order which reveres womanhood, which upholds law and constitutional government, which cares for the widow and the fatherless, which inculcates the highest moral and religious principles, which fosters patriotism, which instructs in toleration and obliges conscientiousness in human relations.

The most careful brother may

tell his wife that in his Lodge the Holy Bible lies open upon an Altar. The fact is written in a thousand volumes, and is proclaimed in Masonic books of the law.

The manuals and monitors of many Grand Lodges set forth the prayers which are uttered in the degrees -- what is printed by a Grand Lodge cannot in its very nature be a secret from any one. That all Lodges are opened and closed with prayer -- that every Lodge has a Chaplain -- is a secret from no one.

It has been well said that Freemasonry is not a secret society, but a society with secrets. A secret society is one of which only its members know; a society with secrets may be one of which the world knows much.

Grand Lodges publish "Proceedings" in which the actions of the Grand Lodge at annual and special communications are set forth. Many of these contain the names of every man who is a Freemason. To be found in Libraries the world over—these are no more secret documents than is a telephone or city directory.

There is nothing secret about a man being a Freemason -- he is proud of the fact and the Fraternity is proud of him,

Freemasonry appears at times in public -- usually to lay a cornerstone, or to conduct a Masonic funeral. Such ceremonies are performed by Masons who have met and opened a Lodge; the members wear Masonic aprons. Yet some men are so over-cautious they do not dare tell such simple facts as these.

Freemasonry is a charitable, benevolent, educational and religious society. Its principles are proclaimed as widely as men will hear. Its (Continued on page 5)



(Continued from page 4) only secrets are in methods of recognition and of symbolic instruction.

"But my wife wants to know what we do in Lodge" - someone states.

Tell her what you do in Lodge! You meet and open. The opening is a ritualistic ceremony in which brethren are reminded of that which is high and holy in Freemasonry. The chaplain invokes the blessing of God. Minutes are read, visitors welcomed, matters of business and charity are discussed, action is taken. The ill are heard from through the Committee on the Sick; letters from absent brethren are read. Is there anything here, except the words and form of ritualistic ceremony, that the world may not know?

A degree is conferred. Here, indeed, is secrecy! But the degree is but a manner of teaching, and if Freemason's desire to keep it to themselves, it is because those who are not Masons cannot understand. The instructor of mathematics would gladly teach the binomial theorem to a kindergarten child, but the child would not know even the meaning of the words. He must have knowledge before he can comprehend. So it is with the degree -- it can be understood only by those who have been taught -- and it is itself that teaching.

The degree over, there follows a social hour, a fraternizing and fellowship. Then the Lodge is closed, again with a ceremony which is uplifting and inspiring. Again the blessing of the Most High is asked and the brethren return to their homes. He is poor of spirit indeed who takes not with him something of inspiration from

this that he has heard as simple as it is profound.

If there be anywhere a member of the Order who is not a loving husband and father: who does not give loyalty to his friends and government; who is not honored of men and reverent before God; who is not charitable and compassionate in act as well as thought: who is not honorable before all men: such a one has not abided by that which Masonry teaches. nor lived up to the obligations he has most solemnly assumed. And of this there is no secrecy --Masonry proclaims these teachings as her own, and any Freemason may tell them to whom

Freemasonry is meaningless unless we shape those ideals into actual life and work. Only then will it and our work become real and effective.

The heart of the message of Freemasonry must be in our hearts and its ideals of brother-hood must be in the living practice of our work and lives in whatever form it takes.

A true Mason in his work inspires others, understands others, reasons with others, helps others, appreciates others and yet may even disagree without being disagreeable.

A true Mason in his work also recognizes others and knows that a thank you now and then strengthens the bond of goodwill among men.

If a person at his job is to be a moving force he must bring to it a sincere understanding heart and see each man's need as a challenge to service and to get the best out of our work or life we must put the very best into it. The art of true living includes the power of seeing good in others, in all our

fellow men.

To be successful in our work we must remember those basic fundamentals - tolerance and love.

Masonry may be pushed aside at times for our job, TV, sports, service clubs, etc., but to be successful in whatever work we do we cannot push its principles aside, they must be a part of us.

A man is as great as the truth he speaks, as great as the help he gives, as great as the destiny he seeks, as great as the life he lives.

Let's get down to positive facts and positive life, as we can make it. Rather than waste our energy crying the blues, pointing at problems and practices which are often cited as sure evidence that the world and its people are headed for Hell, non-stop -- we would be better off and more people would listen if we would only Eliminate the Negative and Accentuate the Positive. If we can keep an open mind and have no prejudices toward our fellowman, have more tolerance toward his shortcomings and problems, our outlook on life will improve and strengthen through sharing and being a part of the community in which we live. For, as a rule, people are ready and willing to accept us; the only requirement is that they be given half a chance.

One of our main contributors to breakdown in our relations with others is poor communication. Whenever people fail to express their feelings meaningfully, the distance between us freezes over. It happens between nations too, unfortunately. When a person neither speaks his mind nor listens carefully to what is said by others, then he is on very thin ice. The result is usually a horrible death for personality or a nation.

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There are times to forget Self and think of others. For instance, the Bumble Bee is built in a rather interesting fashion. Scientists say that physically speaking he should not be able to fly. The size and weight of his body do not provide a positive ratio when compared to the span and action of his wings. Aerodynamically the Bumble Bee is a Bungle. Sheer objectivity contends that he should never make it off the ground - but the Bumble Bee doesn't know that, so he flies anyway.

Many people are so conscious of themselves, so inhibited by their fears and so dominated by their own shortcomings or the opinion of others, that they never get off the ground either, not in their personal lives or in the field of productive living. They may know the facts of life and be completely familiar with the habits of the birds and bees, but life only begins there. Hopefully it will not end before what appears to be impossible has been achieved by transcending personal and physical failings. Let's not forget that funny old Bumble Bee in our approach to love and marriage and life in the community.

Every day is a present. How do you open it? Are you excited about how you will use it? There is nothing much sadder than to hear someone say, as we often have, "You know I have wasted my life, if only I could live it over again". Comments like this come from people over 40, who have taken life pretty much for granted. They have managed to fill in the time with the usual rounds; eating sleeping and earning a living. Then suddenly they realize that better than half their life span has slipped away and they haven't been living at all - just existing.

There is a great deal more to life than this. We have minds which transcend the body and talents which, when developed, nurture the soul. Most, I am sure, would agree and say, "Yes, life is more than existing". Perhaps even those who do little more than exist would agree. This leads me to believe that there must be still another key to life. Indeed, there is the conviction that each new day is not just time to be spent but a treasure to be wisely invested.

Past Master Degree

The requirements to become a Worshipful Master under the Grand Lodge of Maryland include receiving the Past Master's Degree prior to his installation as Worshipful Master. The degree has one of the most significant lessons for anyone who is about to assume the role as a leader. The responsibility of conferring the Past Master's Degree is that of our Past Masters Associations. Just a gentle reminder, each Association should have a minimum of one full rehearsal, preferably two, with a Deputy Grand Lecturer in attendance. The forms and ceremony are well known and should be consistent throughout the State. I am asking regional Deputy Grand Lecturers to contact each PMA to establish a rehearsal for next years conferring of the degree. Also, I am asking each Lodge to attend the degree in their area. Please remember each of us who are Past Master's reached this position because Past Master's took the time to attend and confer the degree for us.

The Lodge presents four \$500.00 scholarships to two local high schools. Money from the breakfasts and parking cars help support these activities. Last year we had twenty two applications for the scholarships.

In the future Harmony would like to start an endowment fund for scholarships for higher education. This will be a major undertaking, and will take a period of time before it can be operational.

Ironically, ten years ago William L. Kugel, P.M. and Lawrence E Wilson, P.M. and several brothers of Prince Frederick Lodge presented a Fifty Year Service Award to Bro. Plott at the same facility.

Why Ritual?

Most often when I hear this question, I also hear this answer given, "The ritual is the only thing that distinguishes us from other organizations and fraternities. However, I believe there is a better answer or rather explanation. In the Summer 2000 edition of the Empire State Mason, a publication of the Grand Lodge of New York I read what I consider the best explanation of the reason and purpose of Masonic ritual that I have ever come across in all my Masonic reads.

Q. Why do we have a Ritual and why so much care in the matter of its correct rendition?

A. The best answer has been given by Right Worshipful Henry G. Meacham in his book, "Stations

In the book he and Places." states, "Most people are inarticulate in one way or another. By this, I mean that many of us find it difficult to express ourselves exactly as we wish. This is not altogether a matter of formal training, for I have known men with a considerable scholastic background who have found it difficult to express themselves clearly and to the point. A precise manner of expressing certain truths makes it easy for all engaged in the work of character building in the course of conferring a degree (for that is precisely what we attempt when conferring a degree), to express certain ideas of accuracy. The man without an extensive education and whose occupation does not lead him to consider the exact shades of meaning in words, by use of the Ritual discovers himself as articulate as his Brother more fortunate in the matter of formal training. That was William Preston's idea as he wrote the Middle Chamber Lecture.

As a Deputy Grand Lecturer in Southern Maryland, I have often paraphrased Right Worshipful Meacham to defend our pursuit of "letter perfect' ritual. Masonic ritual ensures one thing - the lesson of Freemasonry is imparted to each new candidate in exactly the same words, if not the same manner, regardless of who is presiding in the East. The Worshipful Master could be a college dean, a farmer, a banker, a jeweler, a gardener or a clerk. He could have finished grade school or he might be a P.H.D.. He could be poor, middleclass or rich. The point is whatever the Worshipful Master's station in life, as Worshipful Master he is going to pass on the lessons of our fraternity, just like every one before him and everyone behind him, as pure and unimpaired as possible. We are all human and do not do perfect ritual but it conditions you and reminds you again of a most important virtue - discipline.

I conclude this article by calling your attention to "the gardener". President Theodore Roosevelt was a Freemason, one of 14 U.S. Presidents that have been Freemasons, and belonged to a lodge on Long Island in his town of Oyster Bay. It was at a time that he he was President of the United States and he was home and decided to attend lodge. The lodge opened and he was sitting on the sideline with his brethren and when lodge opened, he observed that his neighbor's gardener was Worshipful Master. The lodge events of (Continued on page 9)



(Continued from page 8) the evening went on and when lodge was closed, another side-liner brother came up to Brother Teddy Roosevelt and asked, "How does it feel to be President of the United States sitting in lodge as a side-liner and your neighbor's gardener is serving as Worshipful Master?" Brother Teddy Roosevelt is purported to have replied, "It is good for him, and it is good for me" Brother Roosevelt certainly knew the lesson our ritual teaches - "We Meet On The Level------".

Why Ritual? If you do not understand by now, you may be part of the crowd that is "racing today's time clock. Heavy foot on the gas pedal - racing for an immediate destination, not the ultimate one. Something to think about.

Grand Master's Amnesty Program

As mentioned in my comments this past November, I am instituting an "Amnesty Program" for all Brethren dropped in the past for non-payment of dues, and nonpayment of dues only! A directive has been mailed to all Lodge Secretaries and to each Grand Inspector with instructions as to how to proceed in the implementation of this program. Included is a letter from your Grand Master inviting any Brother who so chooses, to re-affiliate with Freemasonry in general and his Lodge in particular without fear of rejection. Each invitation letter will have attached to it a current years dues notice and will not require the Brother to repetition his lodge for admission. It will simply require our Brother to remit the current year's dues and his name shall be returned to the rolls of his respective lodge.

My Brethren, we have all been taught the tenets of our institution

are: Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. I submit to you all, that as the Prodigal Son was returned to his father so we must be willing to receive our lost Brethren back into our Lodges with open arms. It is my fervent belief that we can only imagine what some of these Brethren have been through in their lives. Maybe some of them have fallen on hard times or become disillusioned with our fraternity. Quite possibly a private pique or quarrel has caused them to not return to lodge and now, later in life some might like to re-associate themselves with our fraternity but are fearful their absence might cause them to be rejected. This program removes all such impediments and I invite them all to seriously consider this offer.

This program will continue until midnight October 17, 2005 at which time I will require each lodge to prepare and present to the Grand Secretary's Office a report reflecting the results of this program. This report is to be submitted no later than October 31. 2005. I realize this will create some extra work for Secretaries but, the Secretary and the Worshipful Master may appoint a committee to take on the necessary work to complete this task and I expect every lodge to put forth the utmost effort to contact each and every Brother affected by this program. I have been asked how this would affect an application to the Masonic Homes. Let there be no mistake, the requirements for admission into our Masonic Homes state: you must be a Maryland Mason in GOOD STANDING for ten years and a resident of Maryland for five years. Enough said!

HOWARD LODGE NO. 101 150th YEAR CELEBRATION

Howard Lodge No. 101 will host their 150-Year Celebration on May 16, 2005. We are located at 5585 Levering Ave. Elkridge Md. 21075, just off Washington Blvd. as you cross the Patapsco River Bridge from Baltimore County.

For those who are not familiar with our organization the following may provide some insight as to what we are about.

This significant milestone celebration marks the existence of one of the most successful and unique lodges in the State of Maryland. The Grand Lodge of Maryland chartered the lodge on May 16, 1855. The

lodge really began on November 20, 1854 when Grand Master, Charles Webb, gave 8 Master Masons a dispensation to start a new lodge. Elk Ridge Landing was chosen as the site for the new lodge. A building on Main Street in Elk Ridge Landing (known as Temperance Hall) was chosen as the first facility to house the lodge. Notice the spelling of the town of Elk Ridge (two words). The spelling varied through the years until 1929 when everyone began to use its present spelling of Elkridge, Maryland. The original building is still there and as of the year of 2002, the Lodge room, which was located on the third floor, was still set up as a lodge. Past Master Hugh E. Hines, who died in the year of 2002, visited the lodge during the summer of 1971 and took pictures of the room for our history book. We moved to our present location on Levering Ave during the summer of 1904. The cornerstone was laid by the Grand Lodge of Maryland on August 20, 1904 and was dedicated on May 16, 1905 on our 50th year anniversary. We believe we are successful because our lodge has continued to promote Freemasonry throughout the community. We have and continue to provide scholarships for many students of local high schools and give freely to various charities, and provide financial assistance to the needy, while remaining a good neighbor to the community.

We are proud to have supported our younger generation with organizations, such as; the Jobs Daughters for girls and the DeMolay for boys. Also, we have supported the ladies of the Eastern Star. Howard Lodge has provided a meeting place for many organizations that could not find other facilities.

We are unique because we are the only lodge in the state of

Maryland to be chartered to meet every week. Howard Lodge is the only lodge in the State of Maryland to have 3, 5, and 7 steps and two pillars located on its front porch leading to the temple.

Come celebrate with us the 150 years of our Masonic heritage. Our schedule of events is listed below for your information.



Lodge Courtesy

It is illegal to enter or leave the Lodge room during a ballot; it is discourteous to leave during a speech, or during a degree, except at the several natural periods which end one section and begin another.

Likewise, one should always enter by the Tiled door, approach the altar and be greeted by the Worshipful Master. Exiting the Lodge should be done in the same manner. To slip in unannounced by the preparing room is not proper Masonic conduct, and should never be done.

One does not talk in church. God's House is not for social conversation; it is for worship and the learning of the lesson of the day. A good Mason does not talk during the conferring of a degree. The lodge room is then a Temple of the Great Architect of the Universe, with the

brethren working therein doing their humble best to make better stones for His spiritual Temple. Good manners as well as reverence dictate silence and attention during the work; officers and degree workers cannot do their best if distracted by conversation, and the irreverence cannot help but be distressing to candidates.

A man in lodge is the servant of his brethren, if he engages in any lodge activity. Therefore, no Mason sits while speaking, whether he addresses an officer or another brother. This does not refer to conversation on the benches during refreshment, but to discussion on the floor during business meeting.

The Worshipful Master in the East occupies the most exalted position in the gift of the lodge. A lodge which does not honor its Master, not because of what he himself may be, but on account of the honor given him, is lacking in Masonic courtesy. The position he occupies, not the man, must be given the utmost respect, if the traditions of the Fraternity are to be observed.

It is, therefore, to the Master, not to Jim Smith who happens to be the Master, that you offer a salute when you enter or retire from lodge. Like any other salute, this may be done courteously and as if you meant it, or perfunctorily as if you did not care. Similarly, the salute to the Master is your renewed pledge of fealty and service, your public recognition before all men, of your obligation. It is performed before the Master and the Altar to show him your veneration for his authority, your respect for all that for which he stands. To offer your salute as if you were in a hurry, to lazy properly to make it, or bored with its offering, is to be, Masonically, a boor.

Grand Lodge Summer School
