EDICT. Several organizations have improperly solicited or attempted to solicit funds for various causes either through Subordinate Lodges or by way of lists of members of Subordinate Lodges heretofore published by the Grand Lodge. In view thereof, the Grand Master has promulgated an Edict requiring the Grand Master's dispensation on the release of such information and circumstances under which release of such information is authorized.

BLOOD PROGRAM. Program coordinators are Bros. Edgar Dodd #146 (Balto City and County) and William F. Mortiner #179 (State Area) who operate under the auspices of the Grand Secretary. Assignment of a Group Identification Number (GIN) is being made to each Lodge. Dues cards for 1989 will be imprinted with the GIN assigned to the Lodge. These numbers will be used by donors, whether Masonic or non-Masonic in order for a Lodge to receive credit for the donations. Reports of donor activity will be furnished quarterly to each Lodge.

Donors of 10 gallons or more will be recognized at the Grand Lodge Annual Communication. Persons (Masonic & non-Masonic) achieving each gallon goal will be recognized by the Grand Inspector to the Lodge.

Blood is vitally needed. All are urged to donate—Remember, "Give something of yourself, give the gift of life".

SOLOMON II PROGRAM. Funds have been invested for the purpose of telling about Masonry both in and out of Lodges. Why? Because the average age of our membership is 61. Almost two-thirds of our members are between 61 and 100. There are more members 100 and over than those 21 and 22. Without new members we will slowly diminish in numbers to the extent that we could become extinct. It is vital that we continue our efforts in implementing the Solomon II Program.

STATE AREA LUNCHEON. Preceding the Annual Grand Lodge Communication, representatives of State Area Lodges met and were privileged to hear guest speaker Bro. and Navy Rear Admiral William G. Sizemore who spoke on "Two Hundred Years of the Constitution and Maryland Masonry". He has been a Mason for 38 years with service as a Past National President of the National Sojourners, Inc., W.M. of Cherrydale Lodge #42, VA and memberships in the Scottish and York Rites and the Shrine. He is currently Executive Director of the Navy League of the United States and is involved in other private, fraternal and service organizations. Adm.
