

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

Proposed amendments to the Grand Lodge Constitution which have been forwarded to each Lodge will be voted on at the Grand Lodge Semi-Annual Communication in May. In substance:

- The Grand Lodges of Maryland and the District of Columbia will have concurrent jurisdiction over residents of Montgomery and Prince Georges Counties in Maryland and the District of Columbia. No waivers of territorial jurisdiction will be required for such residents submitting petitions for the degrees to Lodges in these areas. However, waivers of territorial jurisdiction will be considered for Maryland residents who petition Lodges in other jurisdictions where there are extenuating circumstances.
- Only the names of Officers and Past Masters of Lodges will be printed in the Proceedings at five year intervals.



OUR HERITAGE, OUR HEROES, OUR HOPES

During this year in celebration of 200 years of the Grand Lodge of Maryland we will feature a bit of history, insights on the character and accomplishments of some of the men who led us through the years and some noteworthy events during this period.

Our first article is a profile of our First Two Hundred Years prepared and written by our Grand Lodge Historian, Bro. S. Flory Diehl.

THE GRAND LODGE OF MARYLAND COMMEMORATES ITS FIRST TWO HUNDRED YEARS APRIL 17, 1787 to APRIL 17, 1987 by

S. Flory Diehl, Grand Lodge Historian

The first known Maryland Lodge was chartered at Annapolis on Aug. 12, 1750 by Thomas Oxnard, Provincial Grand Master of Mass. In 1764 the Grand Lodge of Pa. received a Grand Lodge warrant from the Grand Lodge of Antients in England, and in 1766 it began to warrant Lodges in Md. and continued to do so until by Dec. 23, 1782 it had warranted no fewer than 10 Lodges. Representatives of five of these Lodges on the Eastern Shore on June 17, 1783 met at Talbot Court House in Easton for the purpose of forming the Grand Lodge of Md. The meeting adjourned to July 31, 1783 when the resolution to form a Grand Lodge was confirmed and Dr. John Coats was elected Grand Master. The meeting adjourned to Dec. 18, 1783 and then adjourned to June 17, 1784. The plan was to secure a Charter from the Grand Lodge of Pa. but that body doubted its authority to charter another Grand Lodge. On April 17, 1787 they met again and resolved to form a Grand Lodge regardless of authority from Pa. Rev. William Smith who lived in Md. but served as Grand Secretary of Pa. presided over the convention and Dr. John Coats who had been a Deputy Grand Master of Pa. and who resided in Md. was elected as the first Grand Master. The Grand Lodge of Pa. on Dec. 18, 1789 officially recognized the Grand Lodge of Md. and extended its best wishes. Only one of the Lodges that participated in the formation of the Grand Lodge survived. that being No. 15 at Fell's Point now Wash. No. 3 in Baltimore the oldest Lodge in Md. The life span of most of the early Lodges was very short, and of the first 43 Lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge, only 4 are still in operation in Md. The Royal Arch Degree was conferred in the early Lodges until the formation of Royal Arch Chapters.

On Sept. 18, 1793, the Grand Lodge represented by Joseph Clark, Junior Grand Warden, acting as Grand Master pro tem,

laid the cornerstone of the National Capitol. President George Washington was invited to perform the Masonic ceremonies. He actually laid the stone in due and ancient form, an act which has led some writers to assert he was "Grand Master pro tem". Brother George Washington gave the gavel he used to lay the corner stone to Lodge No. 9 in Georgetown. This Lodge was chartered on April 21, 1789 by the Grand Lodge of Md. It is now Potomac Lodge No. 5 and one of the most active Lodges in the District of Columbia and the proud caretaker of this beautiful gavel.

The Grand Lodge met in Easton until by 1794 Baltimore had grown so large that it contained about half the Masons in the state, and the Grand Lodge moved its place of meeting to Baltimore where it met in Lodge rooms of subordinate Lodges. In 1804 the Grand Lodge appointed a committee to ascertain the expense of building a Masonic Temple in the city of Baltimore and to devise a mode by lottery or otherwise for that purpose. Lotteries were frequently resorted to for raising funds for such purposes as monuments, churches and other buildings until forbidden by an amendment to the State Constitution in 1835. The Committee reported back in 1805 that the cost of a Masonic Temple including land would be at least ten thousand dollars "it being necessary to have a Masonic Temple that will be an honor to the Fraternity and an ornament to the city". Finally in 1812 the General Assembly of Md. authorized a lottery to raise a sum not to exceed fifty thousand dollars and ultimately the new Masonic Temple was constructed on St. Paul St. between Lexington and Fayette Sts. and dedicated on Nov. 29, 1822.

The Md. Legislature on Dec. 3, 1821 approved an act to incorporate the "Grand Lodge Free and Accepted Masons of Maryland" and by another act of the Maryland Legislature on Jan. 22, 1866 the corporate name was changed to the "Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Maryland".

The years from 1828 to 1838 were trying years for Masonry in the U.S. and particularly in Md. A mysterious incident in western N.Y. in 1828 started an anti-Masonic movement that grew to such intensity that an anti-Masonic political convention was held in Baltimore and on Sept. 28, 1831 nominated William Wirt, a distinguished attorney in Baltimore, for President of the U.S. In 1830, early in the national campaign against Masonry, there were thirty-six Lodges in Md., but by the end of 1839 only thirteen active working Lodges remained and those with a greatly diminished membership totalling less than three hundred members.

In 1843 a significant event happened in Masonic history. From May 8th to 17th representatives of 14 Grand Lodges met in convention in the Masonic Temple in Baltimore to develop a uniform ritual so there would be conformity in the work in the several grand jurisdictions. The convention was presided over by past Grand Master John Dove of Va. A uniform ritual was developed and adopted by the convention. The Grand Masters went back to their various jurisdictions and presented the uniform ritual to their Grand Lodges for adoption. The only Grand Lodge that succeeded in adopting the new ritual was Md. where it is still in use. This explains why the Md. ritual is so different from that of Pa. which warranted most of our earlier Lodges and from the District of Columbia where the early Lodges were under the Grand Lodge of Md.

It was the custom of the Grand Lodge from its organization to hold its annual communication in the spring (April or May) but in 1845 this procedure was reversed and the annual communication was changed to Nov. and the semi-annual to May of each year.

The first Grand Lodge Masonic Temple on St. Paul St. gradually became overcrowded by the continuous growth of the Fraternity and in 1867 it was sold to the city of Baltimore. A new site on Charles St., the location of the present Temple, was purchased and the corner stone of the new Temple was laid Nov. 20, 1866. For a number of years hard luck beset the Charles St. Temples. Christmas Day, 1890, a disastrous fire completely destroyed the interior of the building. It was rebuilt and dedicated Sept. 12, 1893. On Jan. 17, 1908 the Temple was again destroyed by fire. On Nov. 16, 1909 the reconstructed Temple (the third and present Charles St. Temple) was dedicated and has since been in continuous use.

M.W. Thomas Jacob Shryock served longer than any other Grand Master but not for 33 years as is so often stated. He was elected for his 33rd year but he died after serving 2½ months of it which resulted in his serving as Grand Master for 32 years 2½ months from Nov. 1885 to Feb. 3, 1918. Many relics and souvenirs of this ardent Mason are either in use in Grand Lodge or on display in the Masonic Museum. One of the outstanding features of his administration was the Centennial Celebration in May 1887 when over five thousand Masons marched in parade through the streets of Baltimore to celebrate the occasion.

The second longest incumbency as Grand Master was served by M. W. Benjamin C. Howard who served for 18 years from 1824 to 1842. After M. W. Warren Seipp served as Grand Master for ten years the Grand Lodge adopted the custom of electing Grand Masters for two one-year terms. In Md. we have had three, what we term, Masonic Four Star Generals, those who have served as Grand Presiding Officer of all four York Rite Bodies, namely, Thomas J. Shryock, Warren Seipp, and Edward R. Saunders.

On May 17, 1929 "Bonnie Blink" farm was purchased as a site for the "Md. Masonic Homes" which is now "home" to over 100 of our Masonic Family. The unused part of this farm has become extremely valuable and sales of part of this land has provided much needed finances toward the support of the Home.

Md. has had fifty-nine Grand Masters from M. W. John Coats in 1787 to M. W. Joseph C. Bryan III in 1987. It would be impossible in this concise resume of the activities of the Grand Lodge of Md. to give due credit to those devoted and faithful servants of Freemasonry. Each of these Grand Masters gave of his time and talent and handed down to the Masons of today the prosperity and good repute that is our legacy.

DOOR-TO-VIRTUE OPENS TO GEORGE WASHINGTON
