

It has been 23 years since I was raised as a Master Mason by Grand Master Edward R. Saunders and his Grand Line at the age of 39. Ever since I have regretted that it took me so long to petition my Lodge, Granite No. 177 at St. Michaels, Md. Since that time I have been running hard to make up for the years lost to me in our fraternity, and the friends I never made.

Past Grand Master Bryan stated many times that we are entering the third century of Masonry in Maryland and he invited all within his hearing to join in assuring that it will be a happy and prosperous one. I invite you also in achieving this worthy objective. Let us shake loose the shackles of apathy, quarrels and inertia and replace them with vigor enthusiasm, cheerfulness and faith. Let us fulfill the purposes and objectives of the Solomon II and Dr. John Coats Memorial Lodge No. 1787 programs. Let us join together to promote our collateral bodies; our youth, educational grant, and drug and alcohol prevention programs and march onward and upward as one body in unity, faith and fortitude, always eliminating the negative and accentuating the positive.

May the Supreme Grand Master's blessing rest upon you and may you all enjoy a happy and healthy holiday season.

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GRAND MASTER B. HOPE HARRISON— A PROFILE

With his election and instalation as Grand Master of Masons in Maryland, Bafford Hope Harrison becomes the second Grand Master from Talbot County. The other being our first Grand Master and the founding father of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, Dr. John Coats. He is also named after the Hope family that produced Past Grand Master Daniel Hope who was born and raised in St. Michaels and moved to Baltimore after being graduated

from the local high school.

Born in Cordova, Talbot County, GM Harrison attended schools in Talbot, Caroline and Dorchester Counties, graduating from Hurlock High School in Dorchester County in 1942. There he met his future wife, Willa Catherine Jaynes with whom he has enjoyed a happy and fruitful marriage for over 44 years. They have one son, a member of Granite #177, two daughters and seven grandchildren. The family of Grand Master B. Hope and Willa C. Harrison as shown in the above photo include: At their left, the Barker group with daughter Anne, son-in-law Michael and grandchildren Amber, Joshua, and Justin. At their right, the three members of son, Jerry Hope Harrison's family including daughter-in-law, Mary, granddaughter Jennifer and son Jerry. The far right are members of the Sinclair group: Grandchildren Matthew, Brian, Krista and daughter, Carol.

During World War II, GM Harrison served in the U.S. Navy graduating from the Submarine Training School in New London, CT. He spent most of his naval service on a radar/sonar training ship stationed in New London. After being discharged from the service in February, 1946, GM and Mrs. Harrison moved to

St. Michaels and have lived there ever since.

Now retired, he spent forty years in the construction and real estate business. Becoming an operative mason, he started his own masonry contracting business at the age of 24. A few years later, he enlarged his business to include general contruction, on residential and light industrial projects and some development.

The long hours and pressures of running a business were such that he did not petition his Lodge until he was 39. Since then, however, he has put his heart and soul in the fraternity becoming Worshipful Master of Granite Lodge #177 in 1971 and again in 1978; Worthy Patron of St. Michaels Chapter, O.E.S. for three

terms; and maintained active membership in both the York and Scottish Rite Bodies. He has been active in the Grand Lodge since PGM Middleton appointed him W. Grand Standard Bearer in 1975; he was elected as R.W. Senior Grand Warden in 1981 and a member of the Board of Trustees since 1978.

In addition to his Masonic service, he has served the Methodist Church in almost every capacity from Sunday School Superintendent to Church Lay Leader, a position he still occupies. Active in his community, he has served Talbot County and the town of St. Michaels on several boards and commissions.

Raised on a farm, GM Harrison is still an avid gardener. His ambition is to nourish, promote and help our fraternity grow.

CAN YOU TOP THIS? In 1939, Bro. Elmer Frederick Stein was saluted with honors by his brothers as Worshipful Master of Brightwood Lodge No. 43, FAAM, Washington, D.C. Fifty (50) years later on Dec. 13, 1988, he faced his Lodge again as Worshipful Master. This time it was a little different with an audience of 122 including seven Past Grand Masters, four D.C. Grand Lodge officers, five Past Potentates, representatives of many other bodies, ladies and guests.

Before he was raised as a Master Mason in 1926, MW Bro. Stein was a DeMolay, a member of the Court of Chevaliers and Senior DeMolay. During his 50 year Masonic career he was invested with the Legion of Honor and Grand Cross by the International Supreme Council of DeMolay for his leadership and

service.

His Masonic affiliations are legend including active leadership in the York and Scottish Rites (33°), TCL, Grotto, Sojourners, High Twelve, honorary membership in nine Lodges, Grand Lodge of Israel, etc., etc. It is said that he has a working familiarity with the ritual of all positions and stations in most of these organizations. Chronologically, at 77, he was oldest Grand Master, in 1982, to ever occupy the Grand East in the Grand Lodge of D.C.

He is currently Grand Historian whose latest published work appears in a 1988 reprint of an M.S.A. periodical "Your Masonic Capital City" originally developed by Carl Claudy. His section on "Washington D.C. Masonry Then and Now" can be considered fairly authoritative — he was there!
