A VOTE will be taken at the annual communication on a PROPOS-ED AMENDMENT to the Constitution of the Grand Lodge which provides for an open installation of all officers in addition to the Worshipful Master-Elect. One collectively for the PMs of the Lodge and one collectively for the three designated principal representatives to the Grand Lodge. As provided in Art. VI of the Grand Lodge Constitution "Lodges at a distance from the City of Baltimore may appoint Master Masons from other Lodges to represent them in Grand Lodge, but no brother can represent more than one Lodge at the same time. The Representatives of the absent Lodge may also cast the vote of its Past Masters."

These requirements must be completed and mailed to the Grand Secretary's office by October 31. Dates and a short synopsis of the event must be attested to by the Worshipful Master and Lodge Secretary.


A MASONIC FAMILY REJOICES
