GREETINGS TO ALL:

It has been said that man's failings do not stem from lack of knowledge as much as the lack of understanding. Unless one pauses to think such a statement would seem contradictory because common custom is to regard knowledge and understanding as one and the same thing. Actually they are two very different terms.

To have knowledge is to be informed, but not necessarily to the point of understanding. The latter demands, as a prerequisite. the power to apply knowledge intelligently and efficiently. It further requires the knack of accurate appraisal and a talent for timely action. One must be able to keep things in proper perspective and to get the whole picture instead of being side-tracked by a prominent or spectacular feature of it. It is an accomplishment if you can learn to do it. So many never master the art and fall victims to the subversion, that plays upon sentiment, prejudice and lack of sound self-discipline.

Think back to the days when you were a candidate for the Masonic Degrees. You were proficient in knowledge of the ritual, but you did not arrive at its understanding until you had amassed considerable experience that broadened your perspective. You were informed on the wherefor's but were a bit foggy on the why's. This is a common experience as to be almost routine in all types of human endeavors. It explains why a judicious mix-

ture of experience is excellent leavening for the bread of youth. How many of us, though we may have been members of the Craft for years, find in trying to understand Masonry that it has a depth we didn't suspect nor conceive until we ourselves had plumbed

Meeting will be held in the Corinthian Hall, Masonic Temple, Baltimore, on Monday, May 20, at 7:30 p.m. Agenda includes voting upon proposed amendments described in Memorandum dated March 5 to subordinate lodges. A two-thirds majority of the votes are required for adoption. These amendments, in short form, are as follows:

Art. V, Sec. 1. To provide that if a rule or edict is presented by a Grand Master at a stated Communication of Grand Lodge, it will remain in full force and effect for a period of six years and then will become automatically null and void unless adopted by Grand Lodge as an amendment to the Constitution, or as a Standing Order and Resolution.

Art. XII & XIII. To provide that no member of the Board of Managers or Board of Trustees who has served two consecutive elected terms of three years each shall be eligible for re-election or appointment for three years after his last term to either Board.




