

# MASONIC CHARITIES OF MARYLAND: EARNING ITS' TAX DEDUCTIBLE STATUS

asonic Charities of Maryland (MCM) was approved by the Grand Lodge at the Semi-Annual Communication of May 19, 1986. The Internal Revenue Service approved MCM's application for 501.C.3 status (income tax deductible) on November 12, 1986. At the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge on November 17, 1986 two significant contributions were made. The first was a pledge of \$250,000 to establish an endowment fund for Masonic Charities of Maryland and a contribution of \$82,000 to be used for scholarship awards to be made through the first Education Grant Program in the Spring of 1987.

In 1987 the first Education Grant Program (EGP) was implemented with the awarding of 127 scholarships (\$63,500). In 1988 the program was delayed for approximately 5 months which caused a significant decline to only 91 scholarships being awarded (\$45,500). Due to actions beyond the control of MCM, it was necessary to discontinue the EGP on the summer of 1988.

Masonic Charities of Maryland embarked on a program for the education, prevention and intervention of drug abuse for our youth in conjunction with the Maryland Department of Education and with the support of the Governor of Maryland. The first training seminar for the Student Assistance Program (SAP) was conducted at Washington College from August 16-21, 1987 with representatives from the three Departments of Education representing Baltimore, Kent and Queen Annes Counties. The immediate success of this program was so startling that it was immediately adopted by the National Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children. This program is currently operated by more than 36 Grand Lodge jurisdictions.

Since this program's inception, MCM has contributed more than \$300,000 toward its operation. It has become a vital part of all 23 county and Baltimore City Departments

of Education and operates in every high school in Maryland as well as a very significant number of middle schools. In some areas, it has been established even in elementary schools. The success of these programs has resulted in the adoption by many other state Departments of Education throughout the country. They have modeled their programs after Maryland and rely upon Maryland for initially implementing their programs. The Grand Lodge of Maryland has been the recipient of notable recognition and the public perception of Maryland Masons has improved significantly. Please read the copy of a letter from the Maryland Department of Education which is printed on the reverse side of this report.

In the Spring of 1994, the Maryland Department of Education requested Masonic Charities of Maryland to sponsor and initially fund a similar program to cope with Child Abuse. This is a natural extension of the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Program which is now an integral part of the state's school program.

The Masons of Maryland are credited with the wisdom and generosity to not only initiate these programs, but to make certain that they are funded adequately to assure their success. What better proof can Maryland Masonry use to demonstrate it is truly earning its tax deductible status every day?

Finally, Masonic Charities of Maryland played a substantial role in making the Biennial International Session of the Rainbow for Girls possible in July, 1994. This combined assemblage has again allowed Maryland Masonry to gain national recognition for its work with our youth.

Masonic Charities of Maryland needs the endorsement and financial support of all our Masonic Family in order to continue this important work through your gifts and bequests. We cannot measure the untold success of these programs, but we can share in the combined effort to do so.

On behalf of the Maryland State Department of Education, I want to thank the Masons and the Masonic Charities of Maryland, Inc. for the tremendous support and finantial assistance you have given to the Maryland Student Assistance Program (MSAP) over the past seven years. Your continuous backing of our intervention efforts in schools to help young people overcome alcohol and other drug problems has been catalytic to the institutionalization of the program.

As you know, the Maryland Student Assistance Program has experienced continued growth. The program is in every school system in the state. Over 2000 individuals participate in the intensive training and teams are currently operating in 215 schools. MSAP also have more teams trained. All of this could not have happened without the collaborative partnership forged between our Department and the Masonic Charities.

The model that was developed in 1987, piloted over two years, and then implemented statewide is dynamic and effective. We appreciate and recognize the significant investment the Masons made in Maryland's youth and their families through this powerful program.

The partnership between the Masons and Education was so helpful in providing the seed money and impetus for the Maryland Student Assistance Program that we would like to propose a new area that needs attention -- child abuse and neglect. We will be forwarding a proposal for your consideration and hope that you will look upon it favorably.

Again, thank you for all you have done and continue to do for Maryland's young people.

- Freemasonry is an open, not secretive, society. Our only "secrets" are traditional passwords, signs of recognition, and dramatic presentations of moral lessons.
- · Freemasonry is open to all men of good character who believe in God.
- The Masonic family of organizations is open to all, and includes women's groups and organizations for boys and girls.
- Freemasonry does not require improper oaths. The so-called "ancient penalties" are strictly symbolic. They refer only to the pain any honest man should feel at the thought of violating his word.
- · Both the famous and common man have been Freemasons over the past 300 years. These include statesmen, military leaders, entertainers and churchmen.
- There are 2.5 million American Freemasons and nearly 6 million worldwide.



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
